# Home Building

| OUSING continues this year as a dominant factor in the economic picture. If the demand for new homes holds up, the picture will be a bright

But there is a danger in the present situation; unless the upward trend in some basic material costs levels off-lumber, for instance-a lot of potential home buyers will take themselves out of the market. That is what happened in 1919 when the continuous bidding up of material prices nipped the building boom in the following year.

Today material and labor prices are vastly higher; well beyond the reach of the majority of home-seekers. All the ballyhoo that can be shouted about low-cost homes is inconsequential unless the people are offered prices they can meet. Veteran home builders sense the danger; a large number of newcomers in the field have no realization of what the scramble for quick sales and heavy profits can mean to the future of the home building industry and the many lines of business dependent upon home construction.


