STEEL OUTPUT STILL LIMITED

LONDON — Instructions to western high commissioners in Germany for their present negotiations with the west German government represent no departure from the Washington agreement which fixed the limit of

German steel output at 11,100,000 tons a year, an official government spokesman said here.

The spokesman was commenting on suggestions that any respite of the great August Thyssen steel works or similar plans would swell German production beyond the permitted level.

Mr. Ferguson does not realize the courtesy of most drivers in this city, otherwise there would be considerable pedestrians elsewhere. Pedestrians have the right of way at intersections not wherever they choose.

Again to quote Mr. Ferguson—"If they are unable to make up their minds as to who should move first, I would suggest the gentlemen pull their cars to the curb and let someone else drive." Quite so, but there are drivers who will stay behind the wheel regardless, consequently making Third and McBride a guessing game.

It is a known fact that too many stop signs, at one intersection, tend to confuse the motorist. This contemplates the fact that Third and McBride is overburdened with stop signs. 
