Three prisoners and two insane patients were taken south to New Westminster today on the Prince Rupert in charge of Chief Constable Owen and Constable F. C. Belson of Hazelton. The three prisoners were each under sentence of nine months' imprisonment. William Crosby received two terms of nine months each, to run concurrently, for stealing tools and oats respectively. William Mooney was sentenced for nine months for the theft of a gasoline light tank from J. D. Allen.
